

BASICS



>> TREATY ESTABLISHING THE ENERGY COMMUNITY

- signed in October 2005; entered into force on 1 Juli 2006
- Contracting Parties
 - ► European Union
 - ▶ 8 "Contracting Parties": Albania, BiH, former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, HR, Moldova, Montenegro, Serbia, UNMIK
- **14 EU MS** as "Participants" (since 1.3.2009): AT, BULG, CZ, Cyprus, F, DE, GR, H, IT, NL, ROM, Slovakia, SI, UK
- **3 Observers**: Georgia, Norway, Turkey
- **Ukraine** signed the Treaty on 24 Sept 2010
- Content
 - ▶ implementation of the Treaty (!) acquis → no dynamic adjustment to EU acquis (e.g. 3rd package)!— requires Ministerial Council Decision
 - ▶ deadlines
 - institutional framework

KEY CHALLENGES



- Differences between the Contracting Parties widen over time
- Acquis primary legislation is still
 - NOT sufficiently COMPLIANT with the key provisions of the Acquis
 - NOT sufficiently COHERENT accross the region
- The practical implementation of the Treaty is
 - FAR BEHIND the transposition of the Acquis and development of required LEGAL FRAMEWORK
 - LAGGING BEHIND (in particular) in effective LIBERALIZATION of the END-USER SUPPLY market
- Barriers to cross border trade
 - Destination clauses
 - Import/export fees
 - Different treatment of national and cross border transports



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THE ROLE OF REGULATORS – Legal Basis



- Treaty establishing the Energy Community
 - 2nd EU Gas and Electricty Directives (2003/54/EC, 2003/55/EC) and Regulations ((EC) 1228/2003, (EC) 1775/2005) defining **role of regulators**
- Key role in setting the market framework
 - Approve network tariffs and balancing charges
 - Approve access condictions (market rules)
 - Approve Dispute settlement
 - Regulated TPA is the rule
- Independence is key!
- In praxi...
 - Powers are broadly established in line with the acquis throughout the Region
 - REAL independence is the biggest challenge

THE ROLE OF REGULATORS – 3rd Package Outlook



3rd package improvements for regulators in a nutshell...

- Stronger independence
- Enhanced powers
- Issue binding decisions
- Stronger oversight of energy companies and insight rights
 - carry out investigations into the functioning of the markets and impose proportionate measures
 - require from undertakings relevant information
 - impose effective, proportionate and dissuasive penalties (up to 10% of annual turnover)
 - appropriate rights of investigation and relevant powers of instruction for dispute settlement
- Consumer protection responsibilities
- One single regulatory authority at national level

REGIONAL COOPERATION



Also here: a regional approach is the solution!

- Cooperation of energy regulators supports the harmonized development of regulatory rules in the Energy Community
- Streamlining of regulatory measures and a stable regulatory market framework as key promoter for core objectives of the Treaty market integration, facilitation of investments, competition, security of supply
- Regulatory rules to be harmonized to the maximum extent possible on a cross-border basis
- Otherwise create barriers to trade across borders, to investments and consequently security of supply

⇒ ECRB as a common regional platform of regulators
